

María Sibylla Merían and her 14 Years in Nuremberg

The young artist came to Nuremberg in 1668 through her marriage to Johann Andreas Graff. As the wife of this renowned cityscape painter she was welcome. Her husband and the citizenry gave her lasting support during her development of her many talents.

Until 1682 she lived in this city, one which demonstrated great interest in nature and contained hundreds of private gardens around the fortified city. The garden gates were opened to her and her paintings were in great demand. Other observers of nature and flower painters of both sexes followed her example. In Nuremberg she has never been forgotten. Today she even enjoys esteem as the "first ecologist".
